



THE GENDER SPECTRUM


Figure 3 — Where do you fall on these spectrums?



Sexual orientation refers to your affection and sexual attraction to other persons, based on their sex/gender in relation to your own.



Pronouns 101

Туре	Name	Example
Feminine	She, her, her	She went to the store. I spoke to her. It was her apple.
Masculine	He, him, his	He went to the store. I spoke to him. It was his apple.
Gender Neutral	They, them, their	They went to the store. I spoke to them. It was their apple.
Gender Neutral	Ze, zir/zem, zirs/zes	Ze went to the store. I spoke to zir/zem. It was zirs/zes apple.
Gender Neutral	Ze, hir, hirs	Ze went to the store. I spoke to hir. It was hirs apple.

Please note that these are not the only pronouns. There are an infinite number of pronouns as new ones emerge in our language.

ACRONYM

- Lesbian a homosexual woman
- Gay a homosexual man
- Bi-sexual sexually attracted to both women and men
- Transgender a person whose personal gender and identity does not correspond with their birth sex
- Queer or Questioning not straight and is more a sense of community
- Two Spirit identifies as having both a masculine and feminine spirit; also used by First Nations to describe their sexual, gender or spirit
- Non Binary used to describe individuals who experience a gender identity that is neither male or female and is in between or both genders
- Intersex individuals born with any of several variations in sex characteristics including chromosomes, sex hormones or genitals
- A-Sexual not having sexual feelings towards others
- Pansexual people who are attracted to others regardless of their gender

DOs & DON'Ts for Providers



- . Use gender neutral language and inclusive language.
- . Use terms like "partner" or "significant other."
- · Ask "Are you seeing someone?" or "Are you in a relationship?"

Don't

- · Make assumptions about a person's gender identity, or sexual orientation.
- Don't assume and use the term "boyfriend/girlfriend."
- Don't ask "Do you have a boyfriend/girlfriend?"

Do

Listen to what a person has to say.



Don't

Interject or interrupt.

Do

Be honest when you don't understand something.



Don't

Make assumptions or be disrespectful when asking questions.

Do

Ask them about confidentiality & reassure them of your confidence.



Don't

Out someone's sexual orientation or gender identity.

Do

Use the pronouns that someone asks you to use. When you mess up the pronoun-correct yourself, apologize, and move on.



Don't

Ignore the importance of using the correct pronouns.

Do

Respect an individual's identity & use the terms that someone uses for themselves. Mirror a person's language.



Don't

Use language like "he says he's a girl, but he's really a boy" or "she's not a real girl."

Do


Accept a person's identity.



Don't

Ask invasive questions about someone's body.

- Identity is a person's concept of self. There are many aspects that make up identity (e.g. heritage, religion, beliefs, culture, disability, etc.) and help to shape a person's worldview and connections to others. Sexual orientation and gender identity are also core aspects of a person's identity.

- Safety
- For a person to feel safe, they must not fear the risk of physical, sexual, mental, emotional and/or spiritual injury. Not only is safety a basic need, it is a basic right. The LGBTQ2S+ young people they spoke to identified safety as a significant issue, telling us they need to be hypervigilant to ensure they are safe physically, emotionally, and mentally.

- Many of the young people we talked to had also experienced homelessness. In addition to worrying about their safety and stability in the places they live, they are trying to figure out their sexual and gender identities, often while experiencing homophobia and transphobia and struggling with mental health.
